1st Reading: A letter of Paul to the Romans, 8, 18-25

- 18** - I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us.
- 19** - For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God;
- 20** - for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope
- 21** - that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.
- 22** - We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now;
- 23** - and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.
- 24** - For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen?
- 25** - But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Pope Francis Meditation: (Extracts of the Homily given at San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico, Monday February 15, 2016)

...In many ways there have been attempts to silence and dull this yearning, and in many ways there have been efforts to anaesthetize our soul, and in many ways there have been endeavours to subdue and lull our children and young people into a kind of lassitude by suggesting that nothing can change, that their dreams can never come true. Faced with these attempts, creation itself also raises an objection. "This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she' groans in travail' (Rom 8:22)" (*Laudato si'* 2).

The environmental challenge that we are experiencing and its human causes, affects us all (*Laudato si'* 14) and demands our response. We can no longer remain silent before the greatest environmental crises in world history.....

Today's world, overcome by convenience, needs to learn anew the value of gratitude!

We rejoice in the certainty that "The creator does not abandon us; he never forsakes his loving plan or repents of having created us" (*Laudato si'* 13). We rejoice that Jesus continues to die and rise again in each gesture that we offer to the least of our brothers and sisters...
