I have promised to return to these parishes for confirmations as well as for... ordinations to the priesthood, someday.

FINE COLLABORATION

While pursuing my exploration of the diocese of Edmundston I discovered most devoted collaborators at the Diocesan Centre. Considering the needs to be filled, they are not numerous but are ever available. Coordinator of pastoral affairs is Fr. Bernard Cantin; these last three years he has devoted himself to the implementation of the principal recommendations of the Diocesan Synod (1987-1990). The liturgy office is under the care of Sister Gemma Côté and Father William Rice; Sister Constance Gervais and Mr. Gilles Morin are with the Office of Religious Education. Sister Geraldine Brotherton, F.M.A., is with the Spirituality Centre, and Mrs. Nancy Ward is receptionist-secretary at the diocesan offices. Many challenges await them on a daily basis. Another time I shall tell you about those who are with the École de la Foi [School of Faith, French Sector], as well as other persons.
