Your great generosity allowed us, a diocese of 52,000 people, to place approximately twelve thousand dollars at the disposal of the World Fund for Evangelisation. FALL CAMPAIGN OF DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE

The Canadian Catholic Organisation for Development and Peace is getting to be more known in our milieu for its solidarity with the Third World and for its effectiveness in bringing home to us the causes of underdevelopment and of wars. This year, Development and Peace is trying to raise our awareness the most important [negative] role played in the Third World by the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF), for over fifty years. Throughout the world, in their daily living millions of people suffer from the practices and politics of the IMF and the World Bank. For example, in the Philippines, the severe restrictions attached to structural readjustment have condemned more than 30 million people to a life of misery, obliging them to live below the poverty line. Members of Development and Peace and their partners believe that the Canadian representatives to the IMF and the World Bank should submit the politics of these organisations to the Canadian Parliament and bring the facts out into the open, so that they may be evaluated and controlled by the citizens.

UNICEF

The United Nations International Children's Education Fund (UNICEF) will launch its annual campaign on October 31. As the pictures transmitted by the mass media inform us about the crises existing in such places as Rwanda, the former Yugoslavia, and Somalia, children and mothers form the greatest number of war, famine, and disaster casualties. (Since the end of World War II, there have been 150 armed conflicts worldwide, especially in developing countries.) Besides these child casualties, there are all the worlds forgotten children who live or survive in incredible poverty. According to statistics of the Canadian Children's Health Institute, there were 1.2 million Canadian children living in poverty, in 1991; 73 % of children of single mothers live below the poverty line. All sectors of Canadian society actively participate in the UNICEF Halloween. More than 2 million children collect pennies for their less fortunate brothers and sisters. Last year, Canadians contributed 21.6 million dollars to UNICEF Canada, and this money helped UNICEF set up health, education, nutrition, fresh water and sanitation projects for these children. We must continue more than ever the work already begun.
