STRONG POINTS

*Here are the strong points that have attracted us young people, in the last few years: First of all, we realise that our diocese is concerned about youth and that it is looking for ways to reach them. We appreciate the efforts of our priests to draw closer to the people and make of their churches places of welcome to all. Besides, we see that the lay people are more involved in their parishes. Religion today is no longer pushed on people, but more and more it is by choice that people commit themselves, and this is a challenge to us. We are also happy to see that things are being done for the sake of the Christian unity. We are prod of our Pope who is a true witness to the Gospel, who loves the youth, and who is fearless. He calls us to be fearless in the face of the challenges of our world today. Following his call, the Church is becoming more and more missionary by supporting those organisations that look after the less fortunate. And the pastoral restructuring that was started this year shows hat the Church really wants to grow.

YEARNINGS

*Secondly, we realise that generally speaking youth need education in faith and ritual. We often feel that homilies do not reach us at all. We want to understand the Word of God in a concrete way so as to put it into practice in our daily lives. We often have the feeling that each one is living his religion for himself. The Church of the year 2000 must look more like a family where everyone, young and adult, will be able to feel at home. This Church will have to show more respect for differences, so as to draw closer to the mission that Christ gave to his Church.

INVOLVEMENT

*Finally, here is what we are ready to do in the form of being involved in our diocesan Church. In Sunday celebrations, for example, several young people would like to offer their talents as choir members, readers, or decorators; we would like to participate either individually or in a group. You know, very often all that you have to do is ask... We know that the Church needs us and we want to help in building it up. In ending, we thank the organisers of the Eucharistic Congress for having given us a share in the activities. This initiative shows that the Church is ready to make us enter into the new millennium. »
