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" IF ALL THE GUYS ON EARTH..."

French singer Marcel Achard had his "fifteen minutes of fame" when he recorded a song called "If All the Guys in the World," which made the rounds of youth groups in France, Canada and other Francophone countries. The song was in a way an expression of the yearnings of those who wanted to be citizens of a world without borders, or at least of young people who were looking for friendship, fellowship, and unconditional solidarity. The song can help us understand what love is all about, the love that is promoted in Level Two of the family-and parish-based catechetics programme. The feelings expressed in the song do not necessarily reflect every kind of love.

HAPPINESS: A HABIT?

"If all the guys in the world decided to be pals and one morning shared their hopes and fears with one another; if all the guys in the world became good buddies and walked hand in hand, there would be happiness tomorrow.

"Don't talk about differences; don't say that he is too light-skinned or black as coal, not even that he is not from France; love them any way you can, even if their appearance throws you off, love is like the army, one mustn't try to understand.

'I have my worries and you have yours, I count on my buddies, the guys we don't know can comfort us, too. All hope is ours; happiness is like a habit. With five hundred million friends, there is no fear of being lonely!"

I joined you in singing the most beautiful songs, With you I loved. I loved the time of rest for my tired body, Along Friendship Road.

I learned with you how to be a better person, With you I loved. I loved the advice you gave me at difficult times, Along Friendship Road.

With you, along the road where life leads us, With you shall I love. I shall love in happiness, I shall love in sorrow, Towards the light, along Friendship Road. Through songs like these, friendships developed among the youth. Their bright faces turned towards bright tomorrows. They really wanted to work together at building a proud new world. As they were all united by a deep joy, their journey would be easy.

Jesus Showed His Love
